I. PURPOSE

- Within the first ten days of his presidency, President Trump signed an Executive Order aimed at rolling back regulations, fulfilling one of his campaign pledges.
- This event will showcase progress already achieved, the Administration's strategy for regulatory reform going forward, and significantly increase the pace of reform across the entire federal government.

II. SUMMARY

- The day will be in 2 parts: a Presidential Speech and 10 Agency listening sessions. This will be the first time a comprehensive "whole of government" approach has been utilized to support regulatory reform.
- It will give agencies the opportunity to communicate their achievements and priorities
- It will help set the platform for future progress by embracing a wide cross-section of stakeholders who can be helpful in shaping the regulatory agenda

III. POTUS SPEECH

- The President will deliver a speech to approximately 300 invitees in the White House.
- It will celebrate the achievements to date in eliminating excessive regulations and set his vision for the future of regulatory reform, tasking all Executive Branch Departments to go further and faster.

IV. AGENCY LISTENING SESSIONS

- Following the speech, 10 selected agencies will host listening sessions with a broad base of industry associations, think tanks, companies, and state government leaders
- This event will provide the opportunity for agencies to present their regulatory reform process to a broad base of external regulatory experts and groups as they accelerate reform and ensure the Executive Order's requirements are being met.
- Each designated agency will host a forum to present an update of the agency's regulatory reform actions thus far, plan going forward, and answer questions regarding the ways effective reform can be accelerated.
- Agency Sessions will be hosted by: Agriculture, Commerce, Education, Energy, Health and Human Services, Interior, Labor, Small Business Administration, Transportation, and Treasury
